# CEO'S MESSAGE


One of the hallmarks of the Children's Receiving Home of Sacramento is our nimbleness and ability to evolve quickly to best meet the needs of children who need our care. Since our founding in 1944 as an emergency shelter, we have regularly pioneered new programs to help the most vulnerable youth in the communities we serve.

Right now our main focus is providing intensive mental health services and suicide-prevention treatment. Mental health challenges are on the rise for young people from every background, and even prior to the pandemic we saw a growing demand for our therapeutic mental health programs. Adolescence is an extremely difficult time, and it is even more fraught for our kids who feel lost, abandoned, and discarded by the people who were supposed to love them and care for them.

The last year presented many challenges but also several new opportunities. We are proud that SMUD selected us as a Sustainable Communities Partner. They helped us upgrade our wifi cabling and donated an electric HVAC unit when one of our gas systems stopped working over the summer. I have been heartened to see how many individuals became first-time donors during this year's Big Day of Giving, held a fundraiser or donation drive on our behalf, or set up a recurring donation. The pandemic affected many of our regular fundraising activities, but you stepped up to help us through it.

You ensure that kids who have come from traumatic and uncertain situations know what it feels like to have someone think of and care for them. When they see that they have a loving community surrounding them and supporting them, it's possible for their futures to seem a little brighter.

From preschool to teen programs, the Children's Receiving Home delivers tailored care by expert clinicians, case managers and skills trainers. We remain committed to lift up the region's most vulnerable children and families. Thank you for being one of our key partners in this vital work.

# OUR PROGRAMS

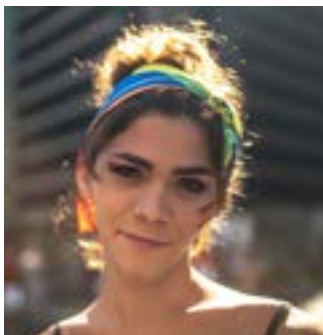


## PARTIAL HOSPITALIZATION PROGRAM

The Partial Hospitalization Program provides hospital diversion and post-hospitalization treatment in a day treatment setting to youth in a safe, home-like, confidential, environment. CRH's experienced team provides intensive and effective treatment delivered through structured services.

## RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT PROGRAM

Our Residential Treatment program serves children and teenagers struggling with trauma, emotional, or behavioral issues that may require individualized, intensive therapy to transition back to a family environment. We provide around-the-clock care and supervision to youth ages 6-21.

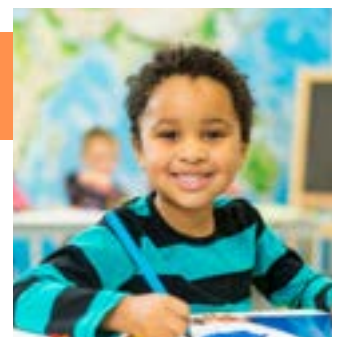


## SUPPORTING COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS

Supporting Community Connections (SCC) is a suicide prevention outreach program for transitional-aged youth in the foster, homeless, and LGBTQ+ communities. SCC offers services that teach youth how to use resources to promote health and well-being. All services are available to youth ages 12-25 in Sacramento County.

## SPROUTS: TRAUMA INFORMED CARE PRESCHOOL

Sprouts is a special preschool that serves the youngest survivors of abuse and neglect through an innovative and trauma-informed curriculum. Healing is emphasized in all areas of child development, including social, emotional, physical, cognitive, and school readiness.

To say that we are grateful for your investments in our incredible youth at the Children's Receiving Home of Sacramento is an understatement. The last 20 months have been the most challenging we've ever faced, but at the same time countless examples of thoughtfulness and generosity of spirit from our community have uplifted us. The kids' resilience has inspired us all. Our staff's dedication to their challenging jobs embodies selfless commitment. And each of you who choose to direct your philanthropy to the youth we serve are models of kindness and compassion. Please know that your advocacy for the children we serve makes a real-world difference.

Like most nonprofits, we've been impacted by COVID-19. Although we've mostly avoided the virus on campus, the same effects that everyone has felt in their lives have been magnified on our 24-hour residential care campus. Due to regulations to keep our kids safe, we were unable to offer

them very many field trips and outings, so it became necessary to keep them engaged in our program with plenty of on-campus activities. We've exhausted our art supplies, toys, electronics and makeup for our teens. Additionally, our inventory of gift cards to stores and restaurants is depleted. While the pandemic did make fundraising a challenge this year, we were able to secure a federal PPP loan which offset some of the reductions in grant funding and event revenue. I'm very hopeful that this holiday season will replenish our shelves and will be a wonderful kick-start to the year ahead.
