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CEO UPDATE

Through our residential treatment program, preschool, resource matching services with current and former foster youth, and our hospital-diversion program, nearly 500 youth and families received treatment, consulting and care from our mental health and direct-care team last year. Their stories and their strength continue to astound me, as does the tireless commitment of the many dedicated members of Team CRH.

Throughout the year we did what we do best – evolved and improved to best meet the needs presented by our clients. We converted an unused building to the warm & welcoming *Goldstein Healing Center*, with custom therapy spaces for youth and families. Our innovative intern program is providing immersive training to the region's next generation of social workers, therapists and psychologists. At the same time, interns provide our team with a valuable perspective to better understand each of our youth's growth (or setbacks).

As part of our SMUD Sustainable Communities partnership, we've replaced several aging gaspowered HVAC units with electric models. We eagerly await the installation of solar panels later this year, courtesy of SMUD.

In the year ahead we will be working with Sacramento County to create a Welcome Center on our campus, ensuring that children entering protective custody receive immediate crisis stabilization, a safe space and nurturing around-the-clock care.



I am grateful that my role affords me the chance to witness so many children creating their roadmap and working hard to achieve their own personal successes, and grateful to our many amazing advocates and supporters who make this work possible.

OUR PROGRAMS



PARTIAL HOSPITALIZATION PROGRAM

The Partial Hospitalization Program provides hospital diversion and post-hospitalization treatment in a day treatment setting to youth in a safe, home-like, confidential, environment. CRH's experienced team provides intensive and effective treatment delivered through structured services to youth ages 10-17.



SUPPORTING COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS

Supporting Community Connections (SCC) is a suicide prevention outreach program for transitional-aged youth in the foster, homeless, and LGBTQ+ communities. SCC offers services that teach youth how to use resources to promote health and well-being. All services are available to youth ages 12-25 in Sacramento County.



RESIDENTIAL TREATMENT PROGRAM

Our Residential Treatment program serves children and teenagers struggling with trauma, emotional, or behavioral issues that may require individualized, intensive therapy to transition back to a family environment. We provide around-the-clock care and supervision to youth ages 6-21.



SPROUTS

Sprouts is a special trauma informed-care preschool that serves the youngest survivors of abuse and neglect (2-5 years old) through an innovative and trauma-informed curriculum. Healing is emphasized in all areas of child development, including social, emotional, physical, cognitive, and school readiness.




78% of youth who participated in the Partial Hospitalization Program (PHP) demonstrated a reduction in symptoms


STORIES OF INSPIRATION



A 23-year-old homeless single mother reached out hoping to regain custody of her infant son. Our team connected her with parenting courses and helped her navigate the process. Within two weeks she earned supervised visits with her son and is close to securing full custody.



A four-year-old girl came to our Preschool with behaviors that caused her removal from a prior school. She hit, kicked, destroyed toys, and grunted to communicate. By graduation she was using words, responding to expectations, & playing with peers. Her parents noted a change at home - she is a more responsive, happy child.



15-year-old client in the Partial Hospitalization Program was struggling with depression, anger, anxiety, and suicidal ideation. In our program he excelled. The family began using the coping skills we taught the kiddo. He left our program able to manage the symptoms that had been debilitating.




