# Alums Speak

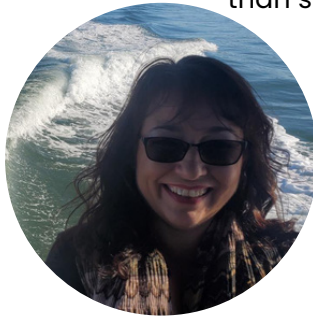

**80% of our clients** receiving residential treatment reported that they felt more stable after completing their time with us.

We welcomed **12 college students** to our internship program, providing them hands on, practical experience to successfully pursue careers in education, counseling, or social work.

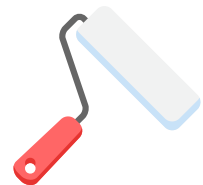


Welcome

# CRH's Best-Kept Secret: Farm-to-Fork Child Nutrition Program

One of CRH's most impactful services, yet often overlooked, is our Children's Nutrition Program. At CRH, we make a steadfast commitment: *no child under our roof goes hungry.*

**Our dedicated food services team prepares over 12,000 meals and snacks each year in our fully equipped kitchen!** But it doesn't stop there. In our garden, kids get hands-on with food in a truly farm-to-fork experience. They help grow vegetables, tend to the plants, and learn where their food comes from—*literally from the ground up.*



## Financial Stewardship

As many community services are downsizing and nonprofits are closing their doors due to funding shortages, CRH remains a steadfast presence for the children and families who rely on us. Despite ongoing financial challenges, we remain committed to our mission and the well-being of our clients.

While navigating funding reductions and government-imposed constraints on our ability to expand services, our resolve is unwavering. CRH adapting by leading collaborative efforts with peer agencies, developing solutions that strengthen our collective ability to meet the evolving needs of local youth.

More than 85% of all funds received are allocated directly to program delivery.

Together, with partners like you, we will weather every challenge and ensure that hope and care remain accessible.

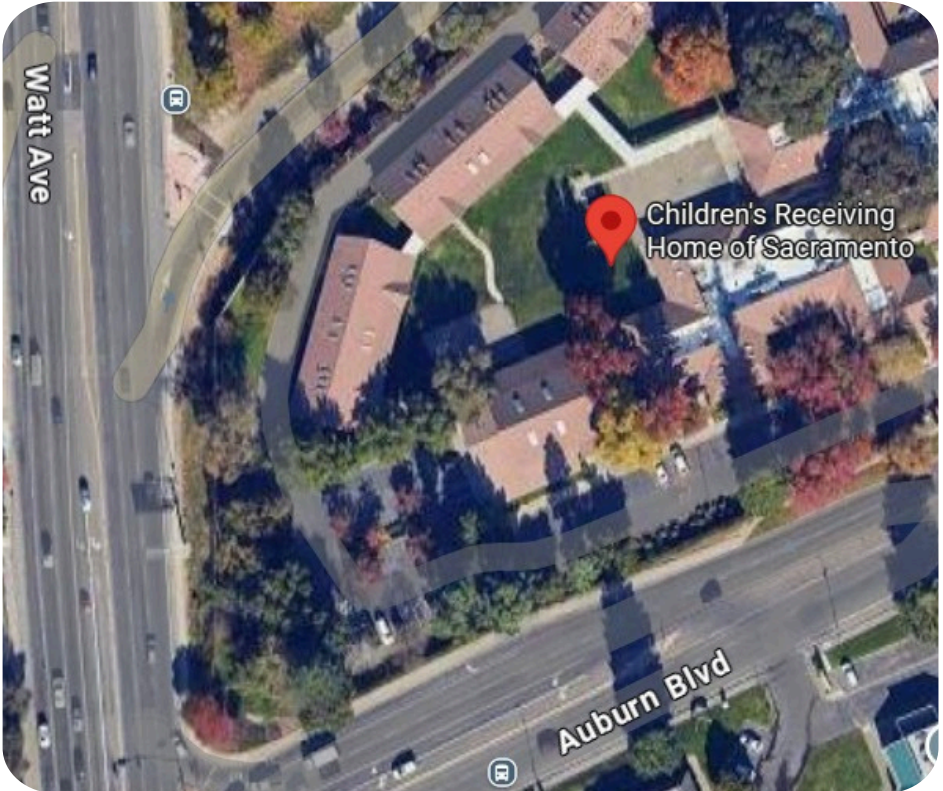
